LETTER FROM THE BOARD

Dear Partners and Friends,

In 2016, the Washington Forrest Foundation gave over \$740,000 to over 60 nonprofit organizations working in Arlington, Virginia. We are enthused to release this report on our Arlington impact, while also looking forward to celebrating the Foundation's 50th anniversary in 2018.

With such a milestone, it has reminded us of our family's long history in South Arlington and its commitment to life on Columbia Pike and Four Mile Run, since the 1870's.

For nearly 50 years we have been proud to support Arlington and other surrounding communities within Virginia through the Washington Forrest Foundation, established by our relative Benjamin M. Smith in 1968, "for the purpose of improving and enhancing the quality of life in Northern Virginia and especially Arlington."

This simple, but effective mission still holds true. In 2016, we recommitted ourselves to this important work with a renewed focus to fund projects in Arlington, particularly in South Arlington along Columbia Pike, Nauck, Four Mile Run, and the surrounding South Arlington neighborhoods. These neighborhoods mirror the history of our family and the connection we have had for more than a century both living and working in these neighborhoods.

Although the communities and their demographics have changed, many of the needs remain the same.

In 2017, we continue to be privileged to work alongside many nonprofit partners to impact and improve the quality of life for residents of South Arlington.

We have worked with many of the same nonprofit partners over decades, including groups such as A-SPAN, Arlington Food Assistance Center, Aspire! Learning, Arlington Free Clinic, Arlington Public Schools, Arlington Thrive, Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization, Doorways, Virginia Hospital Center/Arlington Pediatric Center, the YMCA and others. These nonprofits are a critical part of the fabric of the South Arlington community. Without them, it is difficult to fathom that South Arlington could be the diverse, welcoming, and vibrant community that we see today.

Those of us working with Washington Forrest Foundation look forward to a year of continued partnership, growth, and commitment to supporting the community we call home.

They ensure that the most vulnerable among us are cared for and supported. In 2016, the WashingtonForrest Foundation committed almost \$400,000 to support the activities of South Arlington safety net providers.
